FAMILY FRIENDLY

[Austin Nature and Science Center](#)

2389 Stratford Dr., 512-974-3888

Located inside Austin's famed Zilker Park, the ANSC is a beautiful and exciting outdoor park for children and families. Kids can see live wildlife, dig for fossils at the Dino Pit and discover hidden gems of the landscape at the Naturalist Workshop. The ANSC offers multiple programs for adults as well, such as rock climbing, caving and night canoeing. The park is free and open until 5 p.m. daily.

[Bullock Texas State History Museum](#)

1800 N. Congress Ave., 512-936-8746

Three floors of exhibits detail the peoples and events that shaped the Lone Star State. The Spirit Theatre tells the story of Texas in 3-D, while the IMAX theatre showcases specialty and mainstream films on a Texas-sized screen. Pricing includes exhibits: \$9-13. IMAX: \$7-14. Texas Spirit Theatre: \$3-7.

The Thinkery is an engaging and interactive children's museum located in Austin's beautiful Mueller community. This new museum is designed especially for children's enrichment and the exhibitions focus on science, technology, engineering, arts and math to build creativity and knowledge. Tickets can be purchased online or at the door for \$9 (some discounted rates are available).

[Zilker Park/Barton Springs Pool](#)

Austin's 361-acre park is home to picnic facilities, a disc golf course, a large playground for children, the Zilker Zephyr train (great for kids/families), and Barton Springs Pool, an urban oasis where swimmers plunge into 68-degree, spring-fed waters. Park: \$3 parking. Pricing \$1-4. Free picnic facilities, playground.

HISTORY & CULTURE

Asian American Resource Center

8401 Cameron Rd., 512-974-1700

The brand new Asian American Resource Center showcases the best of Austin's Asian American culture through education, activities and exhibits. Family friendly events like "Planet Music" are hosted regularly through the City of Austin.

Emma S. Barrientos Mexican American Cultural Center (ESB-MACC)

600 River St., 512-974-3772

The ESBMACC is Austin's premier resource for Mexican American culture and heritage. They offer multiple art exhibits and regular performance art events such as live theater and music. The exhibits are free and open to the public, but be sure to check the event calendar for upcoming shows and festivals.

George Washington Carver Museum and Cultural Center

The George Washington Carver Museum and Cultural Center is an expansive museum that is dedicated to the celebration and conservation of African-American heritage. Multiple exhibits, including a children's exhibit, cultural events and classes and a theatre are free and open to the public Monday through Saturday.

Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center

4801 La Crosse Ave., 512-232-0100

Founded in 1982, the center commemorates Lady Bird Johnson's contributions to the Hill Country environment and landscape, as well as introduces locals and visitors alike to native plants and flowers. Throughout the year, the center also welcomes families and gardening enthusiasts for events and educational sessions. Admission is \$10 for adults and free for children 4 years and under.

LBJ Presidential Library

2313 Red River St., 512-721-0220

Exhibits chronicle the political life and times of LBJ. The First Lady's Gallery highlights the legacy of Lady Bird Johnson. The collection's focus is on six decades of American history and how the Johnsons fit into those times.

Texas State Capitol

1100 Congress Ave., 512-463-8586

This sunset red edifice is the largest of America's 50 statehouses and stands 14 feet taller than the U.S. Capitol. Parking garage located at 1201 San Jacinto Blvd. Free guided tours depart every 15 minutes from the south lobby.

ICONIC MUSIC VENUES

Austin City Limits Live at the Moody Theater (ACL Live)

310 W. Willie Nelson Blvd., 512-225-7999

Austin City Limits Live at The Moody Theater is a state-of-the-art, 2,700+ person capacity live music venue that also serves as the new home of the KLRU-TV produced PBS program “Austin City Limits,” the longest running music series in American television history. One of two dedicated live music venues in the country built to the U.S. Green Building Council’s LEED rated standards of sustainability.

Antone's Nightclub

305 E 5th St., 512-814-0361

Since first opening on Sixth Street in 1975, his club has hosted the likes of B.B. King, Buddy Guy, Eric Clapton, and Stevie Ray Vaughan. Now the legendary club has moved to the corner of Fifth and Lavaca streets, but it remains the home of the blues in Austin offering space for 650 or less.

The Continental Club

1315 S. Congress Ave., 512-441-2444

One of the city's favorite historic venues since 1957. After a short stint as a burlesque club, the Continental Club became a favorite performance spot of such legends as Stevie Ray Vaughan, Joe Ely, Kinky Friedman and WC Clark. Upstairs, the Continental Gallery features mellow music and jazz.

Emo's East

2015 E. Riverside Dr., 512-693-3667

Alternative, underground, punk and indie bands have been calling this intimate venue home since 1990. With one stage inside and one in the outdoor beer garden, there's a chance to see two shows simultaneously. The walls are covered with murals, and the stool Johnny Cash perched on during his performance here is mounted on the ceiling.

The Mohawk

912 Red River St., 512-666-0877

Great indoor/outdoor venue with a large patio overlooking the main stage. This is the new hub of the Red River District; the lineup includes indie rock, electronica, metal, punk and hip hop music.

The Saxon Pub

1320 S. Lamar Blvd., 512-448-2552

One of the coolest venues in town. “Dive” atmosphere, but with great blues, rock and country acts.

Stubb's BBQ

801 Red River St., 512-480-8341

Stubb's combines two of Austin's best features: live music and barbecue. Sit down for a tasty dinner, and then stick around for a local band on the indoor stage, or a touring band outdoors. The Sunday Gospel Brunch is also popular.

Austin Greenbelt

Various locations and access points across South Austin

Barton Creek Greenbelt is an urban oasis. Its trails provide opportunity for biking, running, rock climbing, swimming and hiking.

Austin Golf Trail

Texas' capital city is one of the country's premier golf destinations, and the Austin Golf Trail provides full-service concierge support in booking golf rounds at dozens of local courses, as well as booking hotel accommodations and other Austin-centric activities. Circuit of The Americas™ (COTA)

COTA is the world's newest home for high performance motorsports racing. The track is the only purpose-built facility in the country designed for Formula 1 racing and is the host circuit for the United States Grand Prix from 2012-2021. The Circuit is designed to be open year-round as a premier entertainment and meeting destination. Features include expansive event space, luxury suites for VIP meetings, top-notch technology, a medical facility and training center, and of course a stage for live music—we are the Live Music Capital of the World®!

Congress Avenue Bridge Bats

Ann Richards Congress Avenue Bridge

SEASONAL – April through October – Austin is home to North America's largest urban bat colony; between 750,000 and 1.5 million Mexican free-tailed bats. These nocturnal wonders emerge from under the Congress Avenue Bridge in search of insects. People watch from the top of the bridge, boats on Lady Bird Lake and local restaurants and hotels as the mammals roll out at dusk and shadow the Austin sky. This event has become one of the most spectacular and unusual tourist attractions. Free.

Congress Avenue Kayaks

74 Trinity St., 512-809-8916

This location caters to first-timer kayakers. Let the pros show you how! Congress Avenue Kayaks offers easy to paddle, kayaks and stand up paddle boards for rent by the hour or by the half-day on Lady Bird Lake, next to the Congress Avenue Bridge.

Lady Bird Lake/Canoe and Paddle Board Rentals

Rowing Dock, 2418 Stratford Dr., 512-459-0999

Kayak, canoe or paddle board on the clear, calm waters of Lady Bird Lake, and catch a great view of the skyline.

Lady Bird Lake Hike & Bike Trail/Stevie Ray Vaughan Memorial

Downtown, from MoPac Expressway to Pleasant Valley Road

At the south end of the Ann Richards Congress Avenue Bridge, find access to the Hike & Bike Trail, which winds around Lady Bird Lake for 10 miles in the heart of downtown. It's great for a morning walk and is usually packed with locals, visitors and celebrities alike. The Stevie Ray Vaughan memorial is on the south bank of the lake, just west of the South First Street Bridge. Free.

NLand Surf Park

4836 E Hwy 71, 512-806-1900

NLand Surf Park is the only inland surfing destination in North America for surfers and wave sport enthusiasts from novices to world-class competitors. The lagoon features 11 surfing areas with four levels. The waves create one, four and perfectly tubing six foot waves every 60 seconds with a lengthy surfing experience of 35 seconds per wave. Created in conjunction with the Spanish engineering firm Wavegarden, widely regarded as a leader in wave technology, both companies are dedicated to environmental stewardship in lockstep with ocean surfing. Even in the most challenging drought conditions, the lagoon is self-sustaining with rainwater.

Omni Barton Creek Resort and Spa Golf

Barton Creek Resort & Spa offers four of Texas' most famous and exceptional courses. The award-winning championship courses, designed by Tom Fazio, Arnold Palmer and Ben Crenshaw/Bill Coore, reflect the natural terrain of the Hill Country. Players find themselves surrounded by verdant hills, lush vegetation and abundant wildlife. A member of the Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary Program for Golf Courses, the resort encourages the preservation and enhancement of wildlife and natural resources on its courses.

Bass Concert Hall Performing Arts Center

Texas Performing Arts' Bass Concert Hall, situated on the University of Texas campus, is a 3,000-seat venue offering the best in music, dance, theatre, Broadway, and concert attractions.

Cap City Comedy Club

Cap City Comedy Club has been bringing the laughs to Austin for more than 30 years. The club offers live shows, open mic nights, and comedy classes.

The Hideout Theatre

Hyde Park Theatre

Long Center for the Performing Arts

This state-of-the-art venue provides performance stages for local arts groups, including the Austin Symphony Orchestra, Austin Lyric Opera and Ballet Austin.

The Paramount and State Theatre

There's nothing like the thrill of a show at the historic Paramount and State Theatres with full seasons of music, comedy, classic films and family shows.

Topfer Theatre at ZACH

202 South Lamar Blvd., 512-476-0541

Austin's regional independent theatre organization, ZACH Theatre opened a new, state-of-the-art stage and education facility. The space holds 420 audience members viewing a 44-foot proscenium with a trapped stage and available orchestra pit. In addition, an 8,600-square foot outdoor plaza is available for private parties.

SHOPPING

2nd Street District

Second to Fourth Street, between Colorado and Guadalupe Streets.

This is Austin's first downtown, pedestrian retail shopping area. Highlights include Jo's Coffee, Rae Cosmetics, Milk + Honey Spa, Eliza Page and the first ever brick and mortar Modcloth.

The Domain

In a town square atmosphere, the north Austin retail development offers 700,000-square feet of restaurants and luxury fashion, including Austin's first Neiman-Marcus, Tiffany and Co., Barney's CO-OP, Louis Vuitton and Intermix.

Lamar and Fifth Street

Intersection of Lamar Boulevard and Fifth Street

The strip of Lamar just north of Lady Bird Lake is home to Whole Foods' 80,000-square-foot flagship store as well as famed independent stores such as BookPeople and Waterloo Records. Take a stroll down Lamar and discover local storefronts intermixed with quirky retailers.

South First Street

South First Street between Barton Springs and Oltorf

Come explore the best of Austin's vintage and off-the-beaten path retailers. Not limited to retail, South First is home to multiple food trailer lots as well as brick-and-mortar restaurants. From designer vintage to neon art, South First is the heart of local shopping.

South Congress Avenue

Congress Avenue between Academy and Oltorf

The strip of South Congress just below Lady Bird Lake sees politicos, hipsters and students come together to visit antique shops, eclectic restaurants and vintage retailers. This has become the essential "hip strip" of the city.

VISUAL ARTS & MUSEUMS

Austin boasts a variety of fine arts, museums and galleries for the local artist. Take a look at a few select locations below, or find more detail on showings and listings [here](#).

Blanton Museum of Art

200 E. MLK. Jr. Blvd., 512-471-7324

The largest university-owned art collection in the country; acclaimed collections of contemporary Latin American, Western and Renaissance art. Parking in Brazos Garage at 210 E. MLK. Jr. Blvd. Admission is \$9 for adults. There is always free admission on Thursday's!

The Contemporary Austin – The Jones Center

700 Congress Ave., 512-453-5312

This newly-renovated contemporary arts center features three expansive galleries showcasing local, national and international artists. The building itself is worth a photo or two.

The Contemporary Austin – Laguna Gloria

3809 W. 35th St., 512-458-8191

The grounds of Laguna Gloria have delighted visitors for close to 100 years. Stephen F. Austin once owned the property, which he described as being "on the Colorado at the foot of the mountains. Clara Driscoll, known as the savior of the Alamo, donated the site to be used as a museum in 1943. Laguna Gloria displays art and also plays home to the Museum's Art School. Today, the Contemporary Austin offers exhibitions and expanded program at both Laguna Gloria and its downtown facility at 700 Congress Avenue. Admission \$5, free on Tuesdays.

Harry Ransom Center

300 Wes 21st St., 512-471-8944

This amazing cultural archive houses some 41 million literary, film, photographic, cultural and historic artifacts, including the first photograph and an original copy of the Gutenberg Bible. Admission is free.

Mexic-Arte Museum

419 Congress Ave., 512-480-9373

This culturally enriching art museum is centrally located in downtown Austin and is home to over 1,500 works of art and artifacts. Both modern and historical pieces of Mexican, Latino and Latin American art cohabit to create an engaging display of fine art and heritage. Admission is \$5 for adults, \$4 for seniors and students and \$1 for children.

Umlauf Sculpture Garden and Museum

605 Robert E. Lee Rd., 512-445-5282

The Umlauf Sculpture Garden showcases the work of former UT professor emeritus of art, Charles Umlauf, whose statues and sculptures of animals, families, religious figures and mythological characters can now be found throughout the nation as an ethereal, hidden gem. Admission is \$5 for adults, \$3 for seniors and \$1 for students.
