Wilton Manors, Oakland Park & Lazy Lake

For the free spirited, the road to everything whimsical and wonderful runs right through the neighborhoods of Oakland Park, Wilton Manors and Lazy Lake. On the northern outskirts of Fort Lauderdale, these three tight-knit communities are never cookie-cutter.

First stop is Wilton Manors, a suburban haven proud of its vibrant LGBT+ community. It's also a candidate for the most charming, populated with many colorful thrift shops, restaurants, bars and clubs. Discover adorable mom-and-pop cafes then explore specialty boutiques packed with antiques and handcrafted finds.

Tucked away within the boundaries of Wilton Manors, visitors might stumble across the ficus-laden village of Lazy Lake – the county's smallest municipality with only 24 residents.

And in the city of Oakland Park, residents and visitors alike can enjoy a bevy of community festivities, from the family-friendly Youth Parade (the oldest parade in the county) to a joyous Oktoberfest, where one can sample locally made, awarded craft beer.

In these pages, we'll introduce you to favorite nooks and crannies, giving you insider insight into the people and places that make this area truly special.

Whether you are a first-time visitor searching to add something unexpected to your itinerary or a South Florida native looking for new adventures right in your backyard, we invite you to experience the unique treasures tucked away in these small towns with big hearts.

The quaint communities of Wilton Manors, Oakland Park and Lazy Lake are known by locals for their cozy character, but there's so much more to love.

OAKLAND PARK

▲ A small but mighty city of 41,000 residents, Oakland Park is full of diverse offerings. Once an agricultural community, the area was first incorporated in 1925 as Floranada. Following a devastating hurricane, undeterred locals re-incorporated four years later as Oakland Park.

A long way from its farming roots, the city retains close-knit camaraderie. From jogging paths to picnic areas, there is plenty for outdoor enthusiasts. Whether it's a rousing Oktoberfest or cool family-friendly movie night, something is always happening at Jaco Pastorius Park, named for the famed jazz bass player and native son. The city's welcoming events, artsy vibe, vintage aesthetic, affinity for great beer and international curiosities all add to its eclectic flair.

WILTON MANORS

▲ Occupying a modest two square miles between the North and South Forks of the Middle River, Wilton Manors is fondly called "The Island City." The area was first envisioned as a playground for the wealthy, but these dreams went bust following the Great Depression. Today, the Richardson Historic Park and Nature Preserve recalls the city's past grandeur, with a manor house and 5.4 acre park.

Formally incorporated in 1947, the town would eventually emerge as a major LGBT+ community and is currently home to the second highest concentration of same-sex couples in the country.

Outdoor enthusiasts will enjoy exploring the riverfront parks that boast canoe trails, a mangrove preserve, and community centers that host intimate cultural and performing arts events. The pride of Wilton Manors, though, is its dedication to diversity and commitment to being a destination for people of all races, sexualities and cultures to live, work and play.

LAZY LAKE

► The Village of Lazy Lake remains a lovingly preserved corner of subtropical wild, doggedly protected by passionate locals. In 1925, the area was a simple limestone quarry supplying the construction of Wilton Manors. Water soon filled the rock pit, creating its storybook lake. Not much for fanfare, or even visitors, Lazy Lake is more of a closely held secret than a tourism attraction.



THE YARD

► The Yard at Wilton Manors is an eclectic collection of boutiques, restaurants and vintage Airstream trailers set against the backdrop of colorful murals and painted trees. Well known in the LGBT+ community for its vibe of independence and creativity, The Yard is an escape from the urban crush of the surrounding city. Plenty of open work space makes this a hot choice for freelancers and entrepreneurs looking to escape home offices. Formerly known as Eucalyptus Gardens, The Yard has culinary offerings to satisfy the gluten-free, vegetarian, as well as the seeker of authentic Mexican fare. The Yard is dog-friendly, ever-evolving with pop-up shops, and perfect for those Instagram snaps. It is open every day 8 a.m.-9 p.m. for your coffee-drinking, remote-working, treasure-hunting, and general pleasure.

HUNTERS NIGHTCLUB

◀ If you are longing for the days of Studio 54, Hunters has you covered. If you love karaoke, Hunters is your place. If dancing is what you seek, whether it is country-and-western line style or cabaret, Hunters has it. Their mission is to be "fun and friendly," and they are delivering on that promise. Located on Wilton Drive, the renovated space features a large dance floor with video screen, a video bar with eight screens and an upstairs lounge overlooking the dance floor. Hunters Nightclub serves up "Spirits Elevated" cocktails, daily drink specials and high-octane entertainment for over-21, predominantly gay patrons. It is not just about the cocktail experience, though that is paramount. It is also about bettering the community through consistent charitable events that benefit their local neighborhoods.

LIPS

Oakland Park

◀ Indulge in the glitz and glamor of a night out at Lips – the ultimate drag dining experience. Hidden in a small plaza off Oakland Park Boulevard, Lips offers an experience complete with over the top shows, glamorous costumes, a three-course dinner menu and fabulous drinks with cheeky names. Hailed as the country's largest cabaret show chain, Lips was founded in New York by prominent drag queen Miss Yvonne Lame over 25 years ago. Since 2007, it has been a popular South Florida venue for birthday parties, bachelorette parties or the casual walk-in. Each night, from Thursday to Sunday, you can expect engaging live entertainment that's heavy on the audience interaction. They even host a gospel brunch on Sundays, offering a special menu with bottomless mimosas and bloody marys. Reservations are encouraged but not required.

THE URBAN BEEKEEPERS

Oakland Park

► There is a lot of buzz about bees. The decline in numbers has set off alarms around the world as food shortages and environmental issues become more prevalent. Bees help pollinate the bulk of the globe's flowering plants, including about one-third of the food we eat. Micro apiaries, like the one at the Discovery Farm and Marketplace in Jaco Pastorius Park, offer people an opportunity to see the everyday work of the mighty bee. A visit to The Urban Beekeepers includes a tour of the property, including the butterfly garden, and discussion of the permaculture and pollinator programs. Then comes the real fun. Visitors of all ages don protective gear and go inside the beehive to observe the bees at work. Of course, you get a taste of their golden elixir. All surfaces are wheelchair accessible, and service animals are allowed.

CHAINBRIDGE DISTILLERY

Oakland Park

◀ Family-owned and operated, the award-winning ChainBridge Distillery carries on the tradition of previous generations as they craft innovative spirits from fruits, vegetables and herbs. Transplant Bela Nahori, along with his wife, sister and parents opened the Oakland Park distillery in 2019. Inspired by the brandies from their native Hungary, ChainBridge is a small batch distillery specializing in fruit brandies, vodka, gin and specialty spirits with adventurous ingredients like carrot and beet. They also have a new silver rum with aged rum on the horizon for your favorite mojito recipe or just to pair with some cola and a wedge of lime. All brandies are distilled from 100% hand-picked fruit. Each batch is rested for at least three months before it is processed, hand-bottled and hand-labeled. Their Florida Basil Vodka features two types of native basil and the process starts the day the farmer picks it. Visitors can enjoy ChainBridge Distillery tours, tasting room offerings and venue rental for those over 21.

Ticket to ride: Whether someone is joining us on a weekend bike ride for the Wilton Collective, the monthly Art Walk, or just dining and drinks, Wilton Manors is a remarkably welcoming community.

Where to chill: On any given Friday or Saturday night, you're likely to find me on the Drive. I might stop by DrYnk or Infinity for a cocktail before checking out the local theater scene. I love catching a play at Island City Stage or the Foundry and then heading out to Hunters afterwards to dance the night away. For something really special, don't miss Wicked Manors. It's one of Florida's largest annual Halloween parties and typically attracts more than 25,000 people. The costumes are just phenomenal.

Can't choose just one: Every Monday, Bona Italian gives a portion of their proceeds to a different charity. On the weekends, it's all about Rosie's for the burgers and lively atmosphere. On the occasional Friday or Saturday I conclude my night at New York Grilled Cheese. The Buffalo chicken grilled cheese sandwich is out of this world. I'd be remiss if I didn't mention one of the latest hotspots, Tulio's Taco and Tequila Bar. It's all the rage.

Having lived the first 20 years of my life largely in the closet, it is still euphoric to be surrounded by my people in an open and welcoming environment.

Where to chill: My coming out experience was largely bar-related, so being in a gay bar brings back that comfort and familiarity. I also love to people-watch, especially at the Alibi on Wilton Drive. Alibi was the first bar I ever visited in Greater Fort Lauderdale. What I remember most, that still thrills me about Wilton Manors, was watching old men enjoy life to its fullest.

Burgers and pizza: You MUST experience Rosie's Bar & Grill. Comfort food galore, attentive servers, and kitschy decor create an experience like no other. The menu has something for everyone, but they are most known for their burgers. Also try Bona Italian Restaurant and Pizza across the street.

The whimsical, eclectic vibe of Wilton Manors is most clearly manifest in the corridor along Wilton Drive. There, you'll find colorful, quirky storefronts offering amazing food, thrifted goodies, art, furnishings, club life and even a few standard business operations. Stop for soup and a sandwich beyond the yellow façade at New York Grilled Cheese then resist the temptation to pop the colorful balloons outside as you enter the Claudia Castillo Art Studio two doors down.

While pastel-painted eye candy abounds along the main strip, just down the street you can find more traditional iconic edifices like the simple, unchanged Dairy Queen that's been selling smiles since 1953, or the Association of Realtors building and Independence Hall Retirement Residence, both boasting two-story porticos and plantation-style shutters. Buildings like Gables Wilton Park and Wilton Station condos take the multifaceted character of this

THE Ale Trail

The Greater Fort Lauderdale area is the perfect up-and-coming spot for those who love beer. New craft breweries, artisan bars and beer gardens are popping up all the time in spots like Oakland Park and Wilton Manors. They are quickly becoming the place to be for a cold pint (followed by some excellent food, if you choose). With that, we introduce our upgrade to the bar crawl: the ale trail. Here are the stops we recommend if you want to make a day of it.



FUNKY BUDDHA BREWERY

Oakland Park

◀ If you live around Oakland Park, you're probably already familiar with Funky Buddha Brewery, brainchild of Ryan Sentz and now co-owned with his brother K.C. The sprawling brewery, bottling plant and taproom has been a staple of the area for going on eight years. Funky Buddha is a pioneer of the local craft beer scene with one of the largest spaces and a stand-out menu. While the brewery's beers are sold in stores across Florida and even beyond state lines, their taproom and signature flavors are what make them exceptional. Very early to this now-popular trend, Funky Buddha produces culinary-inspired beers with exclusively natural ingredients. Past special releases featured the flavors of maple bacon, french toast, and s'mores. And according to John Lynn, their head of marketing, the food menu is "an upscale take on pub food with a lot of South Florida-inspired ingredients."



TATTS AND TACOS BEER GARDEN

Oakland Park

► To round out your wandering and finish on a delicious high note, a stop at Tatts and Tacos is in order. 


FAT TAP BEER BAR AND EATERY



Lazy Lake

THE TINY, TUCKED-AWAY VILLAGE YOU'VE NEVER HEARD OF

If you've passed through Wilton Manors, or you live there, it's likely at one time or another you've found yourself briefly in the tiny village of Lazy Lake.



But it's also possible you didn't notice you were there. The quaint village consists of "fourteen homes surrounded entirely by the City of Wilton Manors," Lazy Lake City Councilor Richard Willard says. There's no main square, no shops, restaurants or parks. Yet, it somehow retains an innate fascination and appeal, simply by continuing to exist and remain independent.

The village was incorporated in the 1950s and, according to Willard, remains the smallest municipality in the entire state of Florida, giving it a unique interest right off the bat. However, the residents of Lazy Lake are almost more keen to remain unnoticed, preferring anonymity in their tranquil, tiny and independent swath of paradise.

Remaining separate from Wilton Manors and other neighboring towns allows Lazy Lake to elect its own mayor and city council, positions held and almost rotated among the residents of those fourteen homes.

But Lazy Lake's greatest appeals might be its unique history and pristine beauty. Originally, in 1925, the creator of Wilton Manors quarried Lazy Lake, creating a pit that would fill with water and amount to little for years. However, in 1946, Charles Lindfors, a purchaser, partnered with Hal Ratliff, a contractor, to create Lazy Lake, a subdivision with privacy and serenity for all of its residents. The first three homes built belonged to the founders of the village.

In 1953, the small group of Lazy Lake residents denied a request to join Wilton Manors. They vehemently voted themselves an independent entity to prevent ever being reclaimed into another town. Lindfors was elected mayor and served the first eight terms in the village's mayoral history. The lush greenery and natural beauty of the neighborhood continued to attract new residents until the final count of fourteen homes was reached.

Over time, people have moved in and out. The town was even briefly put up for sale, but never sold. After it all, Lazy Lake remains both independent and a sanctuary to fewer than 30 residents. And they love it that way.

DEVELOPMENTS

Luxe Living

Two towns north of Fort Lauderdale maintain their small-town feel despite recent developments that have created more immersive, urban-centered living.



Wilton Manors has become a destination for people seeking to balance city-like entertainment options with Florida resort living and a strong sense of community. Neighboring Oakland Park is just a few years ahead in its transformation from another nice suburb into a lively but family-friendly city.

WILTON STATION

◀ Just east of the Five Points downtown area, this gated 10-acre community provides luxury living and on-site retail. The condominium association offers 272 apartments and townhomes that range in size from 1,000 to 2,400 square feet along with resort-style amenities, like a waterfront boardwalk, 19-seat movie theater, waterfront access with kayak storage, full gym, community center perfect for hosting private parties, and heated pool that includes a faux beach, rock waterfall and private cabanas. Village Lane, a cobblestone road shaded on each side by mature trees, cuts through the center of the development, creating a quiet, walkable corridor that makes the complex feel like its own town. Each of the six buildings has a grand entrance on this street, with the warm earth tones, clay tiles and clean lines typical of Moorish revival design.



OAKLAND PARK SQUARE

By its 2026 completion, Oakland Park Square will be the new heart of the city. Current plans for the mixed-use development include 114 apartments, 21 live-work units, 26,000 square feet of ground-floor retail, underground parking, and a new city hall. The modern-style construction will sit across the street from Funky Buddha Brewery and Jaco Pastorius Park, the home for numerous festivals and events throughout the year. The project's investor is a renowned Florida real estate investment firm.

THE VILLAGE AT WILTON MANORS

▲ Sharp lines, cool gray stucco and angled metal roofs mark the 14 three-story townhomes at The Village, located just a block off bustling Wilton Drive Arts and Entertainment District. After plugging in your electric car in the two-vehicle garage, walk up to one of your covered private balconies to look over the landscaped courtyard and community pool. Or, fix dinner in the gourmet kitchen, pulling spices from the European-style tall cabinets as you set your mise en place on the quartz counters. The park across the street includes tennis courts and another just a block away includes a waterfront where you can slip into a kayak.

ON THE Marquee

Throughout the year, events put on by the community for the community celebrate diverse cultures and all are welcome to enjoy the festivities.


